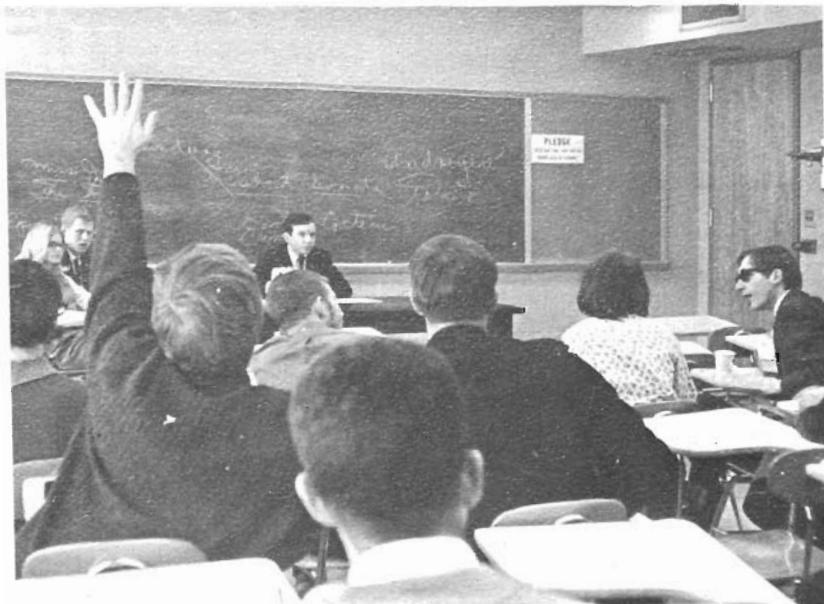

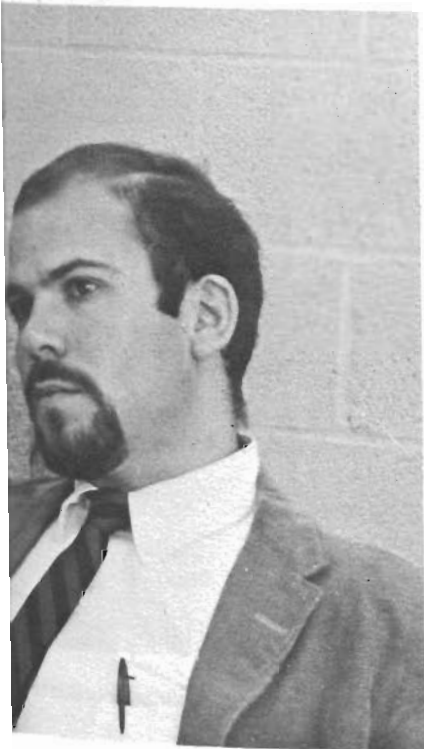


Who? Me?

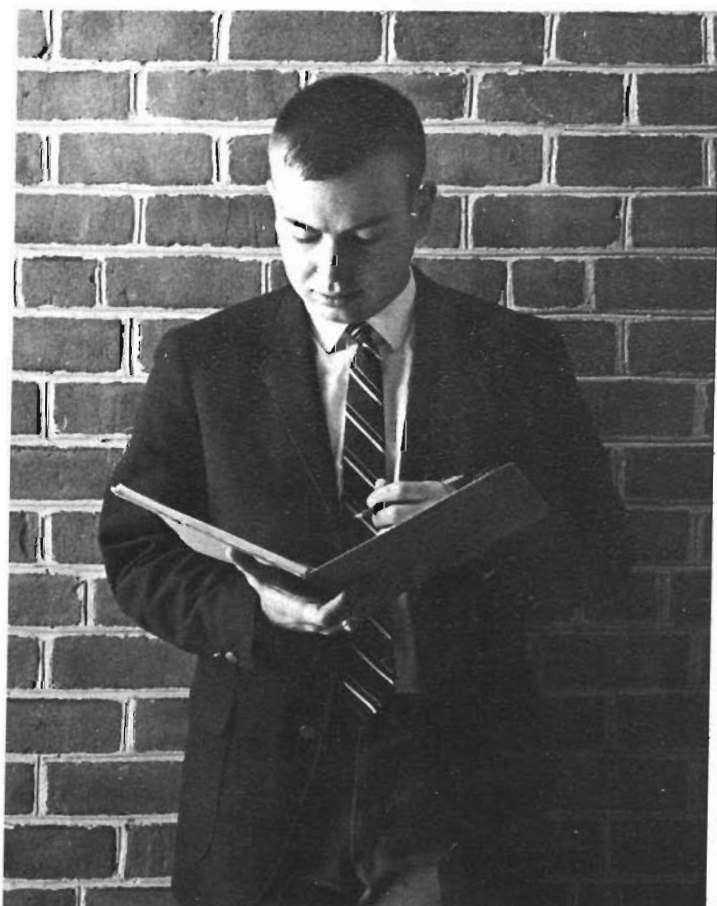

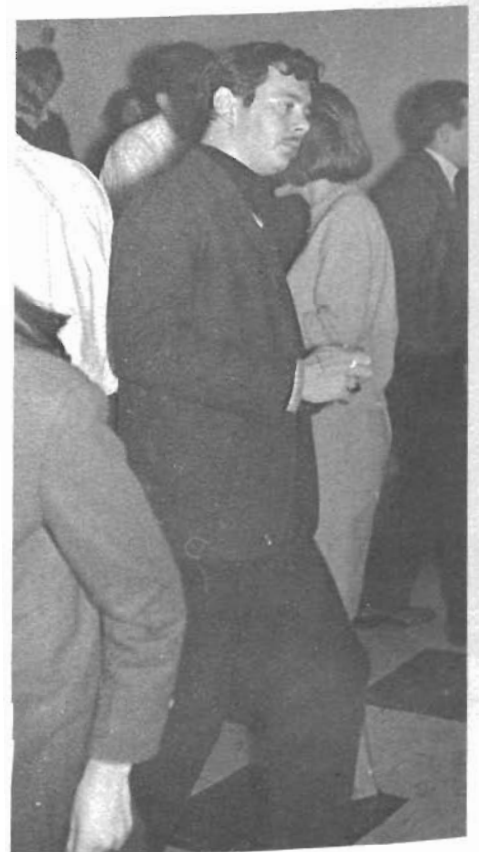

# Honor Committee



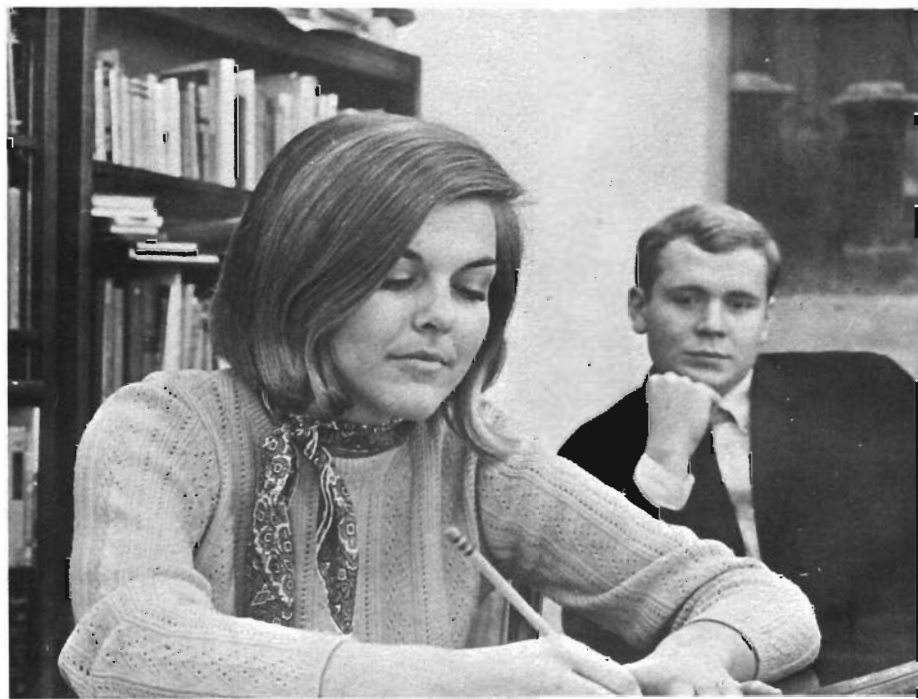

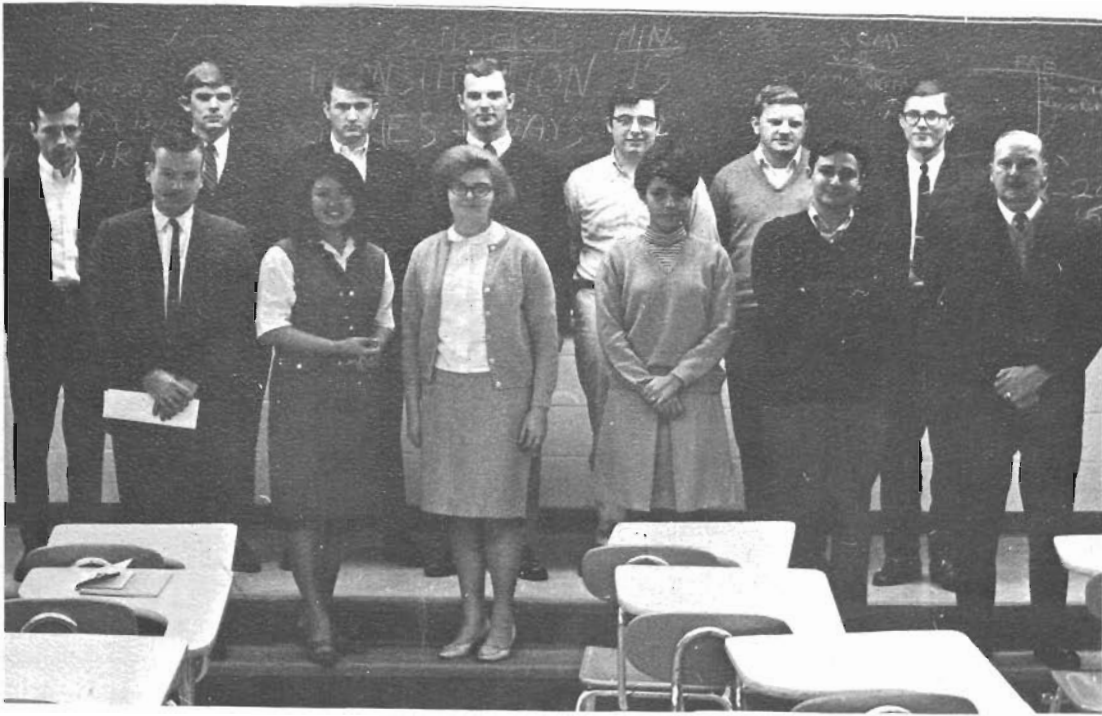
# Circle K

To gain a better insight into the German life and culture, the German Club viewed slides taken by Barry Fink's brother in Germany. In addition, they made a trip to the German Embassy.

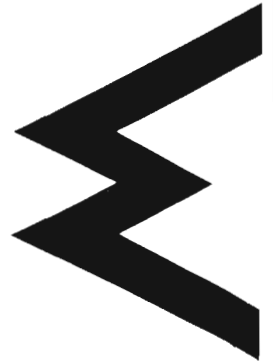
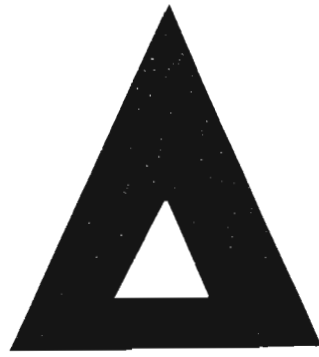

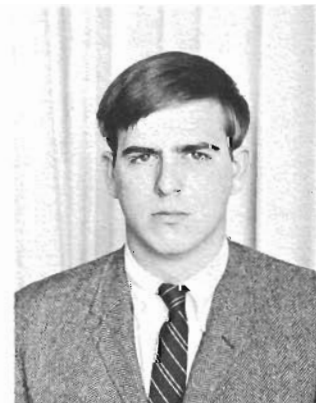

## Club

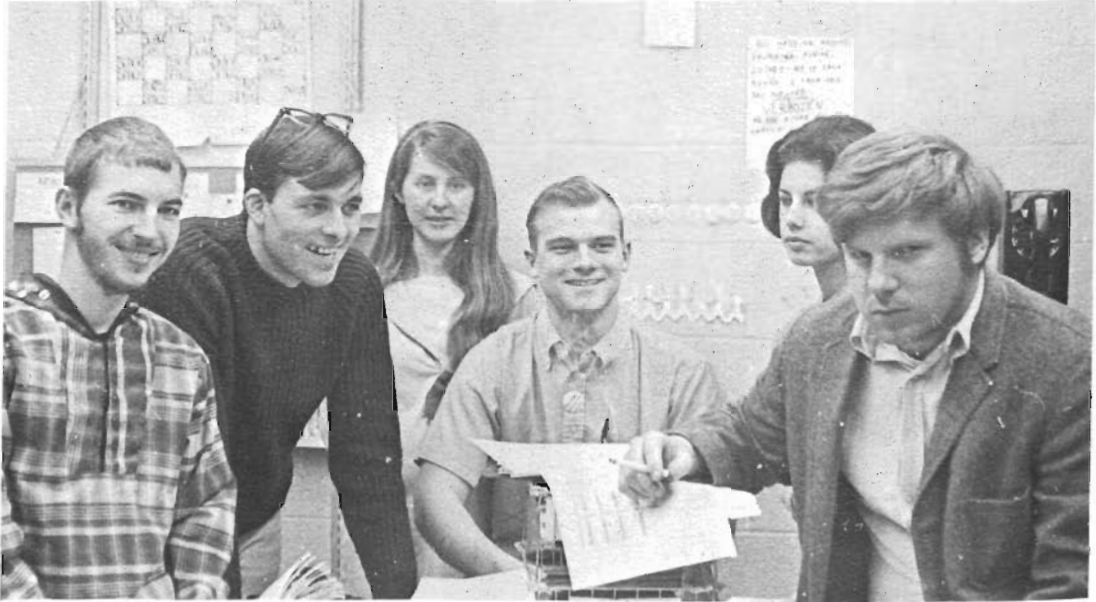

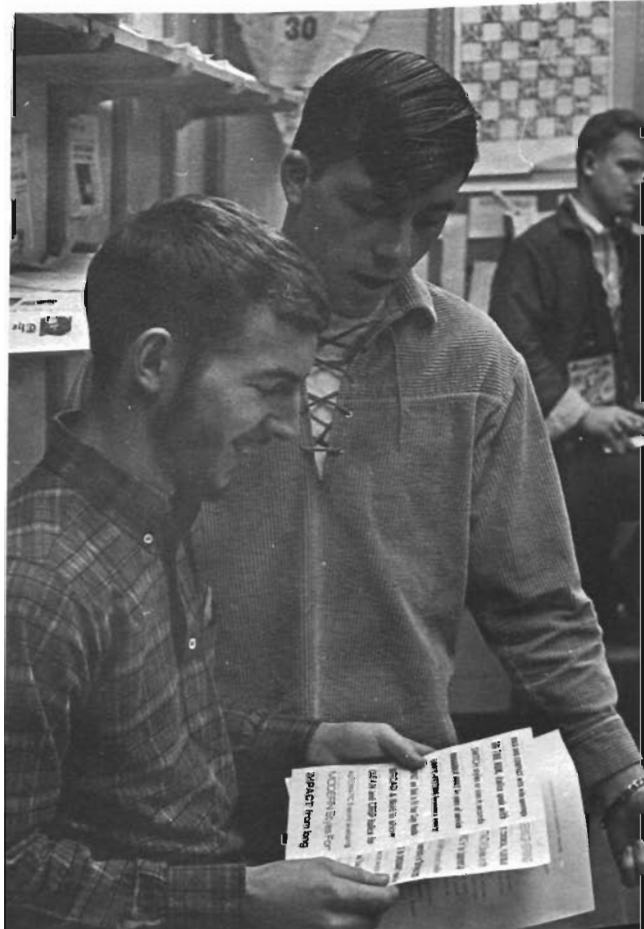
